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Background



”We don’t build collections anymore”

”There is a need for a national strategy for physical collections”

Current problems

- Extensive weeding of print collections in research libraries
 - many short-term weeding decisions
 - losing breadth and depth in collections
 - no coordination
- Unsure situation for special libraries, including library closures
- The legal deposit copies are also for use, and might not last

Project: "National framework for weeding and preservation"

Earlier efforts in Sweden to collaborate
– many attempts but none successful

Looked into international collaborations

An interest from libraries to work closer
together on maintaining print collections.

Report: "Everything for everyone, always"

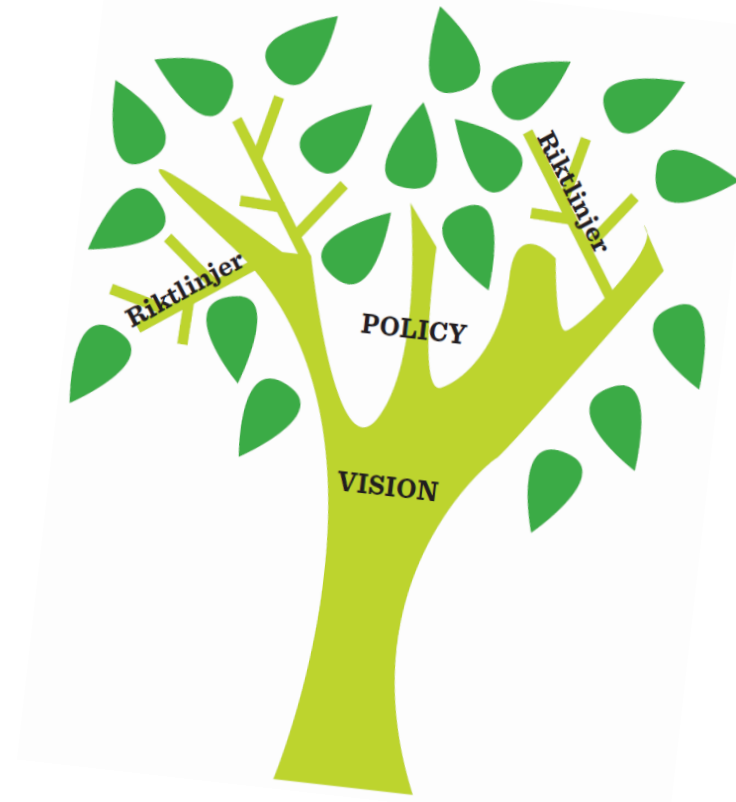


Vision

“Research libraries collaborate for the long term and take joint responsibility for saving, preserving and making material available for the needs of today and the future, for all their target groups”

“for the **benefit of researchers**, today and tomorrow, and in support of the **democratic society**”

“to find **forms for joint preservation** and for coordinated and transparent weeding”

National collection analysis

- National collection analysis using metadata in the national catalogue Libris.
- Analysis similar to a UK analysis from 2016, “Strength in numbers”
→ “scarcity is common”
- What is “rare” and “common” in a Swedish and international context?



National collection analysis

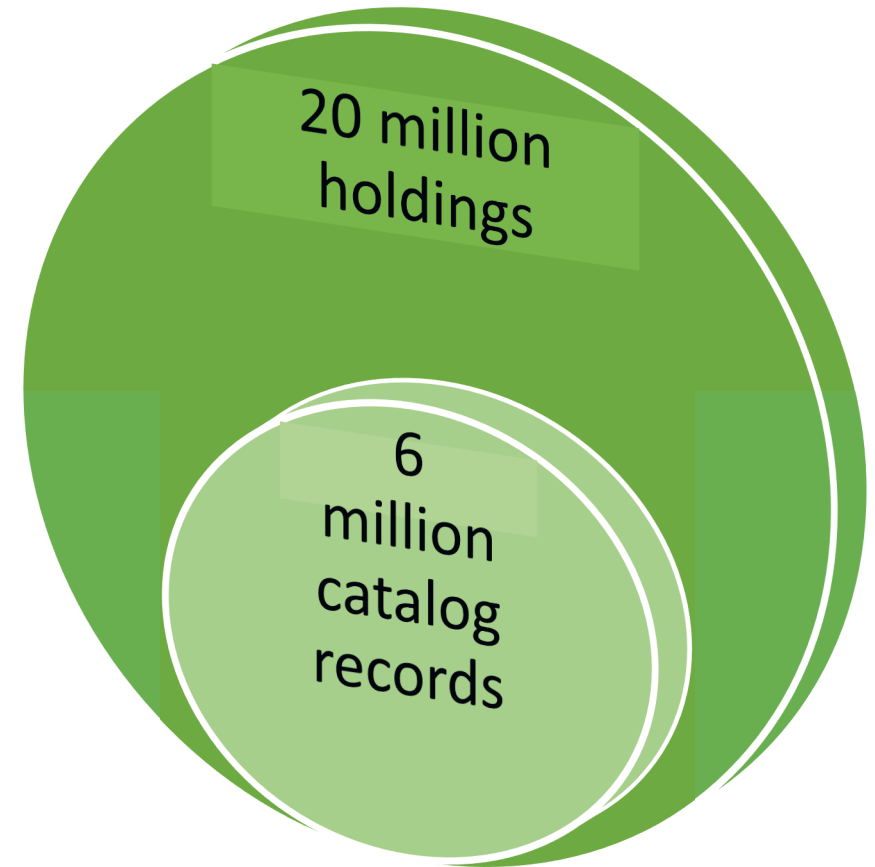
- How many records have few or only one holding?
- How many records have many holdings?
- How are collections distributed between library types? (national/research/special libraries)
- How is the regional distribution?

Preliminary results for print monographs

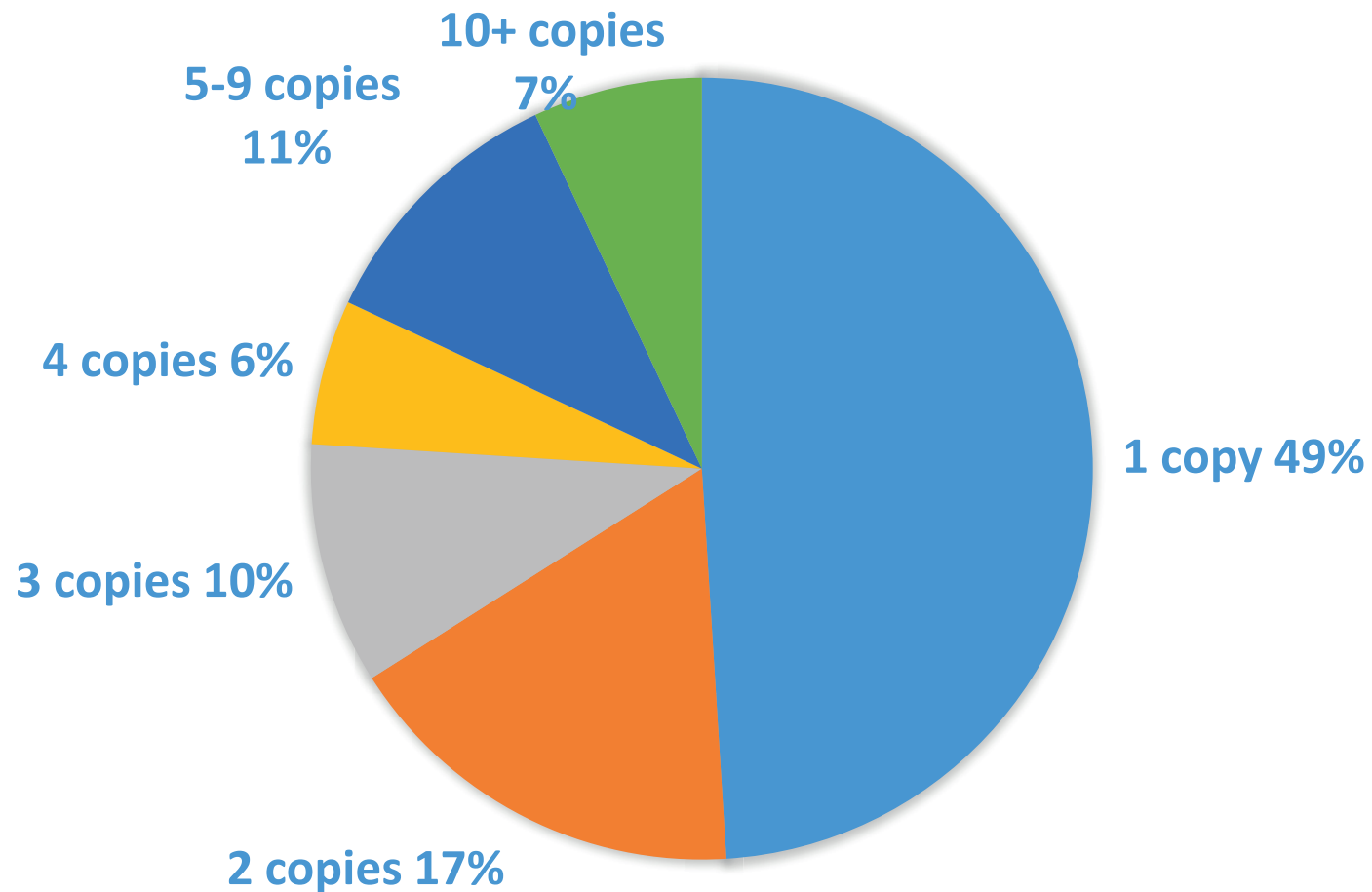
6 million catalog records

20 million holdings

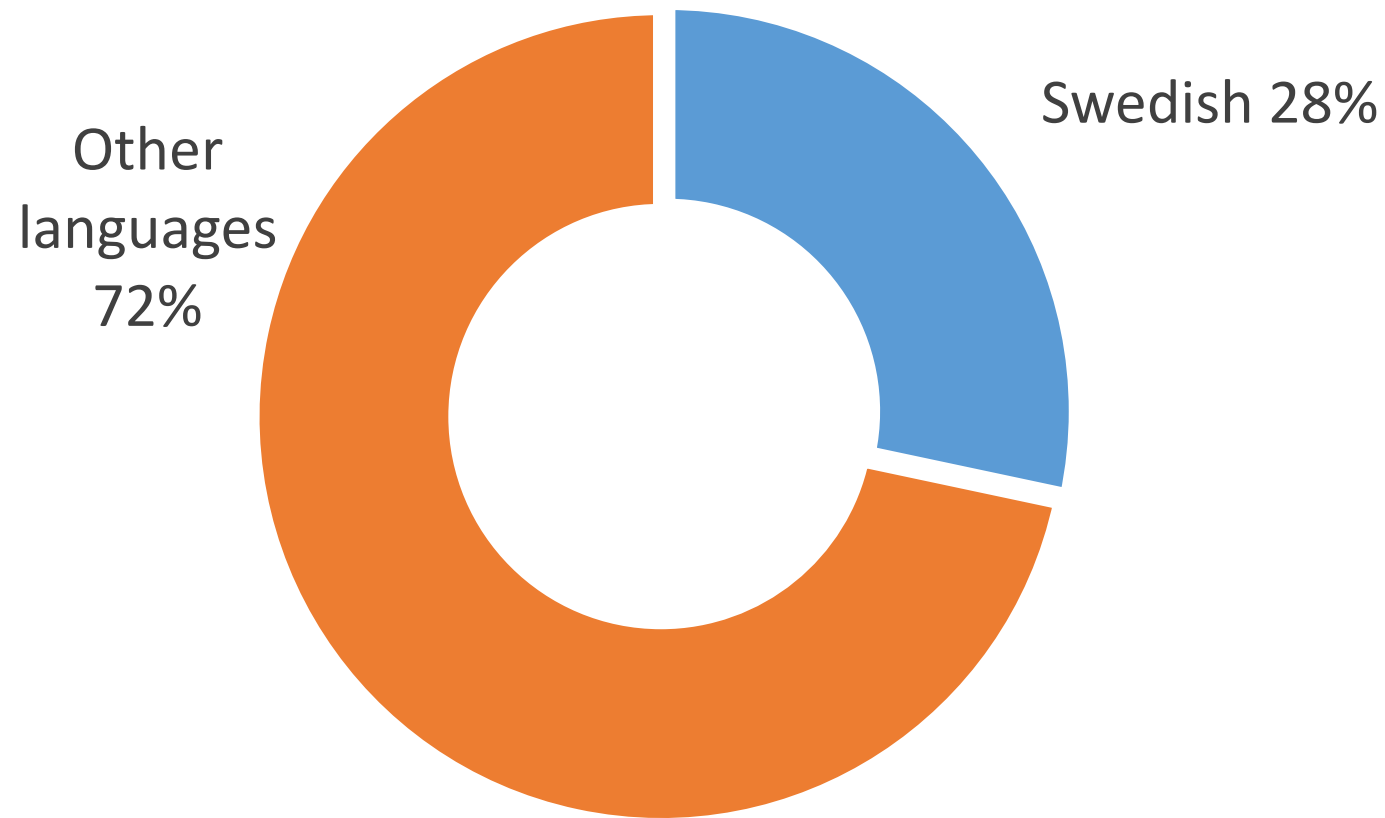
Just over 3 holdings per
catalogue record



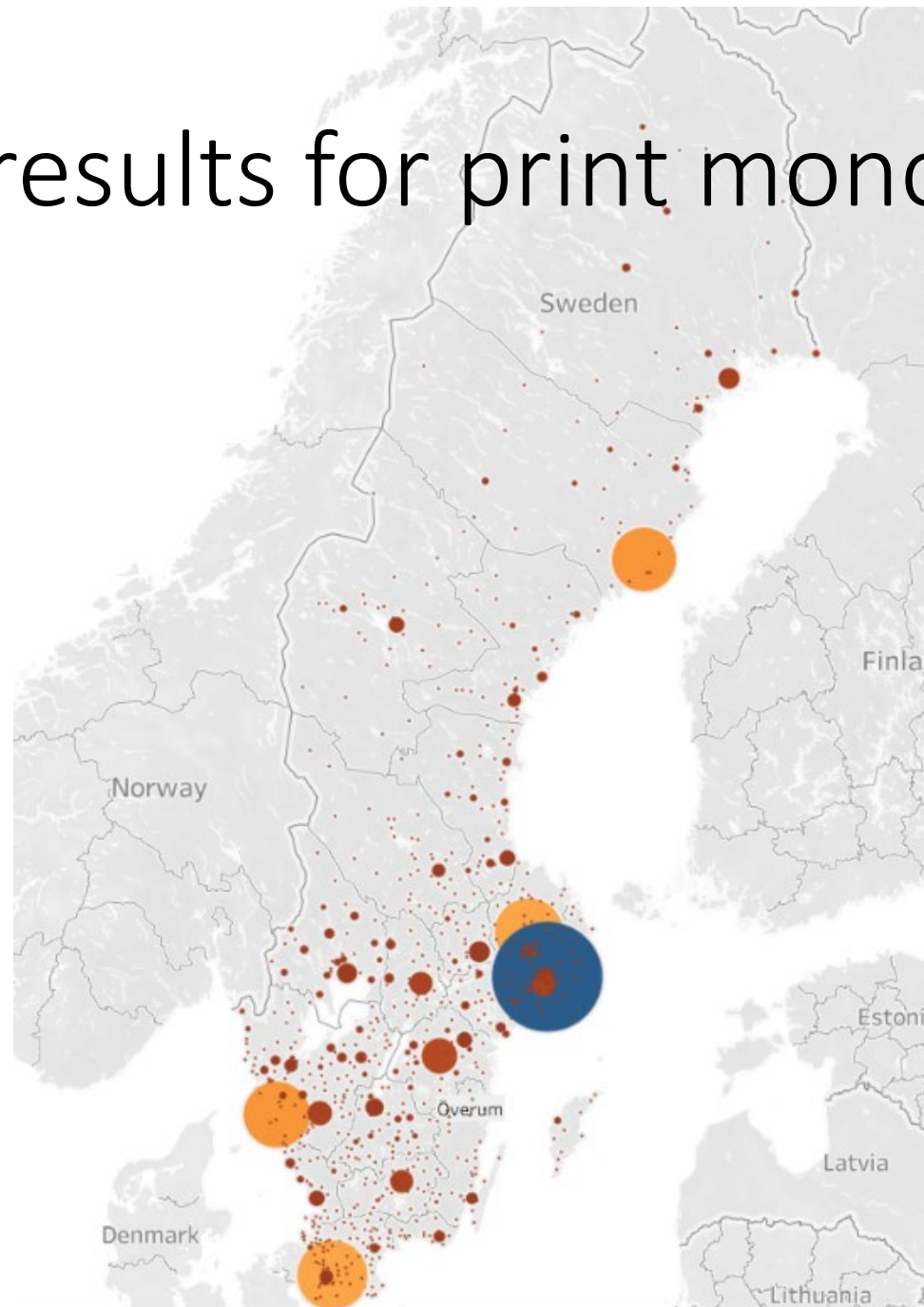
Preliminary results for print monographs

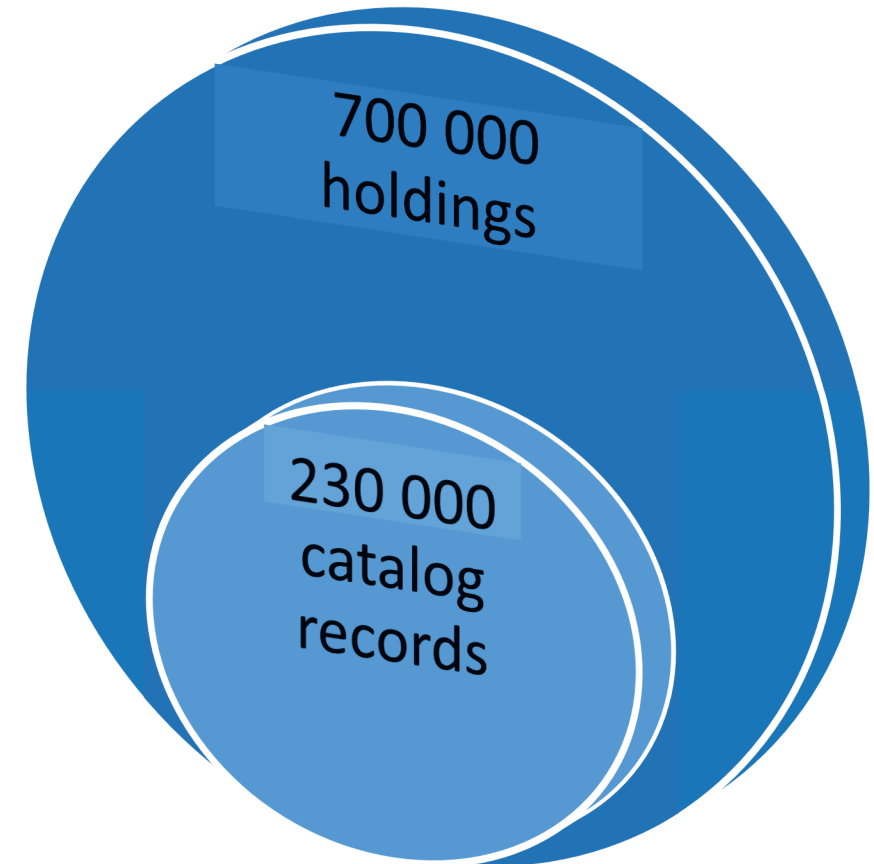


Preliminary results for print journals

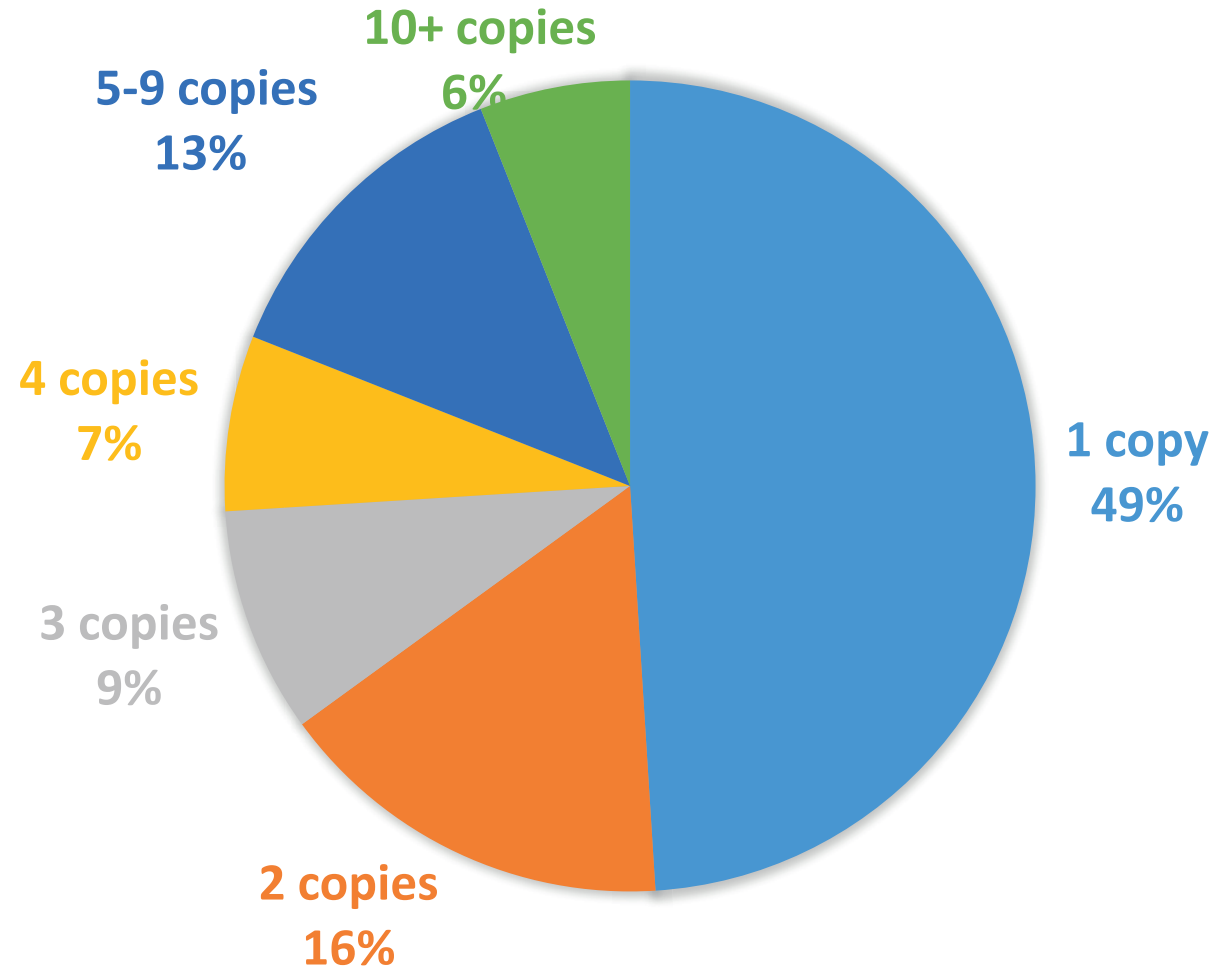
230 000 catalog records

Data set and metadata difficulties

- Not all material is catalogued
 - special libraries collections
 - Pre 1960:s collections from three large university libraries
- Some special libraries are not part of Libris at all
- Different cataloguing rules and praxis
- Difficult to separate some subcategories (like separate reprints)
- Etc etc

→ Can we use the data?

Next steps

Identify areas for collaboration on preservation

- "Last copy management"

Identify areas for collaboration on weeding

- Weeding of print scientific journals (keep 1-2 copies?)
