Message from the PC Chairs

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The iPRES conference series brings together practitioners and researchers from the digital preservation community to promote and inform academic research with practices of digital preservation. Following this tradition, iPRES 2017 not only connects practice and research but also spans from tradition digital preservation topics (file formats, preservation system or certification) to upcoming new trends and challenges (preserving digital art, computer games or management of research data), along this year's conference theme: Keeping Cultural Diversity for the Future in the Digital Space - From Pop Culture to Scholarly Information.

The iPRES 2017 program committee has received 59 high quality research and practitioners submissions from which we were able to accept 14 full papers and 16 short papers.

Three full papers were nominated as best papers by the PC chairs:

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from which a panel of additional judges chose:

Bertrand Caron, Jordan de La Houssaye, Thomas Ledoux and Stephane Reecht, "Life and Death of an Information Package: Implementing the Lifecycle in a Multipurpose Preservation System"

as this year's Best Paper.

As an integral part of the iPRES conference series the poster session provides an opportunity for the digital preservation community to share on-going research, initiatives and new trends. The program committee accepted 13 peer-reviewed posters for presentations. Attendees of the conference were invited to vote for the Best Poster, and based on the votes, the best poster award was given to:
